

Closing Procedures

In the case of lightning, followed by thunder, the pool closes for 30 minutes to allow the storm to pass. If the storm passes, and it is safe for swimmers to return to the pool, the pool is then reopened for swimming. If the thunder and lightning continues to occur, then the staff will close the pool. In the case of heavy rain, resulting in the guards having difficulty seeing the swimmers, the same procedures apply. Depending on the time of day, the pool may reopen; for example the night session could be held if the storm has passed. The staff will use their discretion by watching radar and listening to the weather radio, along with notification by local authorities.

If we have a situation regarding a patron vomiting, or fecal release in the pool, and the area is contained, patrons are asked to exit the pool, the cleaning takes place and then after 30 minutes patrons will be allowed back in the pool. In some cases, the incident may involve a larger area, and then shocking the pool system is required, and the pool needs to close for this process to be completed.

In the case of zero swimmers, we will stay open for at least 60 minutes to wait for patrons to arrive. If patrons do not attend, notification is posted with the information regarding the closure. If this is an afternoon session prior to swimming lessons, the notification will include information that staff will be opening at 6:30 as usual, and same plan will be in place regarding swimmers.

Additional Information

Family Swim is scheduled from 6:30-7:30 Mondays-Thursdays and has been received very well from patrons.

After the first weekend in August the evening session will close at 8:30 PM, Monday-Thursday due to earlier sunsets. Weekend hours will remain the same.

Toward the last week of August, limited hours will be posted as school events begin.

Any time the hours change due to special events, this is communicated to the city, and the information is added to our Facebook page, as well as posted at the pool.

In the event of an early pool closure, due to lack of swimmers, head guards contact the Pool Manager to be sure that the closure can take place.

It is always best practice to stay open regardless of the number of swimmers in the pool.
